



5 Key Fraud Tips: Avoiding Spoofing Scams





Verify the Sender's Email Address and URL

Always double-check the sender's email address and website URL. Spoofed sites often have subtle differences, such as extra letters, characters, or misspellings. Legitimate companies won't ask for sensitive information via email.





Look for the Padlock but Don't Rely on It Alone

While a padlock icon or "https" indicates a secure connection, it doesn't guarantee the site's legitimacy. Fraudsters can also obtain SSL certificates for fake sites. Use this as a quide, not a guarantee.





Never Click on Links in Suspicious Emails

Avoid clicking on links from emails claiming to be from trusted sites. Instead, hover over the link with your mouse to review the URL or go directly to the website by typing the authentic URL into your browser. This reduces the risk of landing on a spoofed page.





Be Cautious with Requests for sensitive banking

information

Legitimate companies rarely, if ever, ask for personal details like passwords or financial information through email or unsolicited messages. Always question such requests, even if they seem urgent.







Educate Yourself and

Others

Awareness is your first line of defense. Share knowledge with friends and family about spoofing scams and encourage them to be cautious. The more people know, the harder it becomes for fraudsters to succeed.

Stay alert and remember when in doubt, check it out!
